I. The Exam

a. Multiple Choice (50%)

- i. Part A 30 questions: Interpretive Communication (Print Texts)
- ii. Part B 35 questions
 - 1. Interpretive Communication (Print and Audio Texts Combined)
 - 2. Interpretive Communication (Audio Texts)

b. Free-Response (50%):

All equally weighted and count for 12.5% of total score.

- i. E-Mail Response: Interpersonal Writing (Formal Voice)
- ii. Persuasive Essay: Presentational Writing
- iii. Conversation: Interpersonal speaking (Informal Voice)
- iv. Cultural Comparison: Presentational Speaking

a. French: 2017 Released Exam

b. German: 2017 Release Exam

c. Spanish: 2019 Exam will be released Fall 2019

III. Best Practices for Students

a. E-Mail Response:

- i. Note the Thème du cours/Thema/Tema curricular
- ii. Read the Introduction/Übersicht/Introducción
- iii. Write in formal voice
- iv. Memorize your formal address and signature formalities.
- v. Answer all questions posed in the email that has been sent to you based on your original request.
- vi. ASK at least one question.

b. Persuasive Essay:

- i. Note the Thème du cours/Thema/Tema curricular
- ii. Read the Sujet de l'essai/Aufsatzthema/Tema del ensayo
- iii. State your point of view in your opening paragraph, take a stance and **argue** your position when writing.
- iv. Integrate rather than summarize information from the three sources into your argument to show you have understood the texts.

c. Conversation:

- i. Note the Thème du cours/Thema/Tema curricular
- ii. Read the Introduction/Übersicht/Introducción
- iii. Informal in nature
- iv. Memorize some set phrases and turns to prepare for a twist in the conversation (i.e "I advise, I suggest, In my opinion"

- ii. Read the Sujet de presentation/Thema des Vortrags/Tema de la presentación
